Break down	Stopped working, crying	My car broke down on my way to office.	
Broke into	Entered forcibly	A thief broke into her house	
Stand on	To depend on; one's opinion or perspective	She stood on her own feet; Where do you stand on the issue of civil rights?	
Stand for	Symbolises	I stand for justice.	
Stand in	Substitute	I will stand in as the 11 <sup>th</sup> player for this match.	
Stand up	remain valid after scrutiny or analysis.	I always stand up for my friends when they're being incorrectly blamed.	
Pull out	Withdraw	He pulled out of the plan	
Gave in	To admit that you have been defeated	After a long fight, he gave in.	
Gave off	to produce something such as a smell, heat, light.	The flowers gave off a scented smell.	
Gave out	To come to an end	Their water supply gave out quickly in the desert.	
Gave away	give something freely as a gift or donation	I gave away all my toys.	
Go away	to disappear or leave.	I have a backache that won't go away.
